



Federal Agencies Considering Proposal for a New Nuclear Powerplant on the Delaware River

Let Your Voice be Heard

PSE&G is seeking an Early Site Permit to allow **construction of a new nuclear power plant on Artificial Island along the Delaware River** (called Salem 4). The Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the US Army Corps of Engineers are both involved in reviewing the project. A Draft Environmental Impact Statement (Draft EIS) has been released for public comment.

Two public meetings are being held (on a single date but at different times) by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to present an overview of the Draft EIS and to accept public comment at that time for those interested. The public meetings are to be held as follows:

In order to receive an Early Site Permit (ESP) from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) PSEG must also receive approval from the US Army Corps of Engineers (Army Corps) under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act and Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbor Act of 1899. The Army Corps is soliciting public comment until October 4 on the proposal. The public notice for comment can be found at:

The Army Corps of Engineers has already proposed a land swap to provide the lands needed for construction. Delaware Riverkeeper Network has strongly opposed. The comment period for that deal closed on August 13, 2014.
